The College Art Gallery presents "Parable of the Garden" focusing on cultural legacy of former Persia

EWING, NJ ... The College Art Gallery will present its fourth exhibition this year, "Parable of the Garden: New Media Art from Iran and Central Asia" from February 20 through March 30. An opening reception will be held on Wednesday, February 20 from 5:00-7:00 p.m. at the gallery, on the first floor of Holman Hall. A gallery discussion with the curators will be held just before the reception at 4:00 p.m.

The exhibit, which geographically focuses on former Persia and its cultural legacy, presents recent media works by artists from countries that were once part of the great empire. The show features the works of ten artists or collaborative teams hailing from Afghanistan, Iran, Kazakhstan, Kyrgyzstan, and Uzbekistan.

Two of the artists now live in Europe, but the rest remain in Central Asia, and all engage in the cultural dialogue of place and identity. The media in which they work include digital photography, video, installation, and graphic design.

The exhibit, curated by Sarah Cunningham, TCNJ gallery director and Deborah Hutton, TCNJ associate professor of art, and Leeza Ahmady, independent curator and recognized expert on contemporary art from Central Asia, thematically explores not only the traditional garden and the contemporary sense of place, but also notions of paradise lost and found, lessons learned and forgotten, and traditions cherished and rejected.

After the artists and artworks were selected, Dr. Hutton gave students in her fall 2007 Arts of Iran course the semester-long project of researching and writing about the individual artists, the thematic focus of the exhibition, and the region's complex history. Students completed research through email interviews with the artists, in-class discussion with each other and the exhibit curators, class lectures, and individually collected data. Excerpts from the student's final research papers provide a useful context in which to situate the works on display in the gallery.
